Ken Olsen donates 7,000 acres in Jackman, ME. What once was a rustic fishing camp becomes **Moose River Outpost, our co-ed camp** dedicated to outdoor adventure for tweens and teenagers. MRO has grown to 8 cabins, with over 40 seasonal staff. MRO's Wilderness Intensive Leadership Development program (WILD) has its inaugural summer.

2015

The Servant and Leadership Training (SALT), at Brookwoods and Deer Run is created.

Our family of camps is the largest Christian camping organization in New England,

welcoming more than 1,000 summer campers and over 5,000 conference and retreat guests each year.

WE'VE GOT BOLD PLANS, NH!

A MULTI-PURPOSE RECREATION BUILDING

No one ever wants a rainy day at camp! Since the majority of our camp programming is done outside, and we have yet to find a way to control the weather, we have dreams for a new multi-purpose building at our New Hampshire site. Instead of squeezing into Moose Hall on wet days, this new building would allow us to hold chapel and appropriate indoor programming during inclement weather.

Additionally, this building would allow more space for regular activities that are best conducted inside, like drama and dance. It would be equipped with a full-sized basketball court, indoor climbing wall, locker rooms, stage, workout room, meeting rooms, flexible seating accommodations, small kitchen, and equipment storage. It will be a wonderful space for all-camp programs such as the Staff Special Talent Show and Incoming Day Rallies, and it would be used during our Conference Season to make Brookwoods an attractive retreat location for college and church groups.

CABIN IMPROVEMENTS

While the experience of camp is designed to be different from home, and sharing facilities and small living spaces build social skills, our cabins need upgrading to keep up with camper needs. We have already begun renovations on several cabins, as well as the Lake Cottage, and would like to continue at a faster pace than our general operations budget allows. At Brookwoods, cabins are being extended 10 feet in order to add a new bathroom. Simultaneously, the electrical and plumbing systems are being upgraded. At Deer Run we will be adding covered front porches, which will create additional areas for fellowship and space for drying wet gear. These projects are not exciting in pictures, but they make a huge difference in the cabin community experience!

HERE WE GO, MRO.

We are thrilled that Moose River Outpost (MRO), our beautiful camp in Jackman, ME, continues to grow to its capacity! But with this steady growth comes the need for program additions and improvements. One of the biggest challenges we face is offering high quality activities to keep up with our increased number of campers.

Skeet Shooting

Would you guess that one of the most popular programs at MRO is Skeet Shooting? The existing range will be relocated to a more accessible location, eliminating the need to drive and adding time back into the campers' activity schedule. The new range will also provide a better suited area to teach this activity in a safe and professional manner, and will offer a Riflery component as a new skill opportunity for our campers.

Woodworking Shop

Adding a woodworking shop would allow us to offer another new skill-based activity. Almost all MRO campers eventually find themselves in a canoe. How cool would it be if they could make their own personalized paddle?! Campers would learn to use scroll saws, sanders, and hand tools to create craft projects such as this, and develop life-long transferable skills.

Basketball Court Pavilion

Most of what we do at MRO happens rain or shine; that's camp life! However, rain can sometimes present a safety concern or result in damaged equipment. With our current camper population—96 campers can't play dodgeball in MRO's Moose Hall! We need a covered outdoor space to accommodate all-camp activities when necessary. The pavilion built over the basketball court would give us much-needed space to continue active programming no matter the weather.

Trip Locker

An essential component of the MRO camper experience is adventure, and the tripping program is an integral part of that. Every session, each cabin completes an overnight trip. In the past 10 years our overnight and day trip numbers have increased exponentially: from 69 campers in 2009 to 240 campers in 2019. The trip locker is earning its keep, to say the least! Additional storage space for non-perishable food and tripping gear is needed to execute an excellent tripping program. In the near future, we hope to expand camp by adding another 2-week session, making room for 96 more campers. This new trip locker will allow us to accommodate this significant growth.





















LEADERSHIP DEVELOPMENT

Camp isn't just for kids! In 1977, Brookwoods and Deer Run added our first co-ed leadership development program after recognizing a need for discipleship and leadership training for older teenagers. Today, our leadership programs are designed primarily to train up mature Christian men and women who will faithfully serve the Kingdom of God and represent Christ in the world. The Next 75 will benefit all of these programs.

LDP

The Leadership Development Program at Brookwoods and Deer Run is a two-summer, 16-week program designed to give campers the opportunity to challenge themselves physically, intellectually, and most importantly, spiritually. This program focuses on community building as well as development of historic Christian disciplines to encourage continued spiritual growth.

WILD

MRO's Wilderness Intensive Leadership Development program is a two-summer, 8-week program focusing on adventure and outdoor skill acquisition, team building, and mentoring. WILD gives participants a strong spiritual foundation through the opportunity to consider deeper questions of the Christian faith in a community and adventure context.

SALT

THE RANGER UNIT

The Ranger Unit is a special place for all who have lived there. Originally a part of Deer Run Lodge, it was relocated when the girls arrived in 1964. The current structure on the waterfront is home to the Brookwoods boys in the Leadership Development Program (LDP). Each summer the program lanches 24 LDPs, many of whom come back to work at camp. Fifty years of active use has taken its toll on the Ranger, and after many extensive repairs, it is time for a complete rebuild!

THE FALCON

Because of the popularity of our SALT program, as well as increased demand for conference space, we plan to build a new cabin on our New Hampshire property that would provide additional space for the SALT girls, experienced staff mentors, and conference guests. Along with extra sleeping space, it would have a meeting room with a fireplace, to provide additional meeting space.

But what will we call this new cabin? Good question! Historically, the cabins that house leadership in New Hampshire are named after birds: Eagle, Owl, Loon, and Hawk. This cabin would follow in that tradition. As of now, the frontrunner is: Falcon!



THE WILD PAVILION

WILD participants spend almost 100% of their time outside! They cook outdoors, live in platform wall tents, and spend half of their time on off-camp adventures. Building a pavilion on the current site will give WILD campers a protected open air space to gather for Bible studies, leadership lessons, and cooking great meals over the fire. This would be their only "shelter" besides their tents!





THE EARTH IS THE LORD'S.

RENEWABLE ENERGY INITIATIVE

At Camp Brookwoods, Deer Run, and Moose River Outpost, we believe it is our responsibility to be careful stewards of God's beautiful creation. In the woods, we strictly follow the cardinal rule of hiking, "leave no trace behind." For over 20 years, our New Hampshire camps have incorporated several processes to reduce the environmental footprint. In accordance with this overarching philosophy, we would like to expand on those efforts by installing solar panels on the roof of the existing horse stables. Currently, our annual New Hampshire energy costs are over \$100K. With the installation of solar panels, we can reduce our energy costs and sell energy back to our provider when we don't experience peak demand. The Next 75 will finance the installation of approximately 90 solar panels, reducing energy costs by an estimated 10% annually. The overall benefit to camp will be 2.5 times our initial investment over the next 25 years.

STAFF DEVELOPMENT

Almost everyone who has been connected to camp would agree: one of our most valued assets is our amazing staff. **They are the single most important factor in determining the success and impact of the camp experience.** Our staff are selected on the basis of spiritual maturity, educational background, leadership, skill set, and interest in young people. Being a camp counselor is more than a job, it is a ministry that demands self-sacrifice and service to others. These young men and women serve as cabin counselors and are ready to teach, mentor, and guide our campers.

We firmly believe that serving on staff develops critical life skills for working with others, accomplishing goals, establishing a solid work ethic, and providing opportunities for deeper faith engagement. The value of experienced staff cannot be overestimated, and the decision to return for a second or third summer is difficult, as opportunities for internships and higher paying jobs often preclude college-age staff from returning. As part of the staff development process, The Next 75 will provide a larger financial incentive to encourage experienced staff to return to serve for subsequent summers.

Serving multiple years on staff is mutually beneficial for both the campers and the staff, making positive impacts on relationships through consistency and the gift of time.

SCHOLARSHIP ENDOWMENT

Call us biased, but we think that camp is one of the greatest experiences ever! We desire to make camp accessible to as many campers and their families as possible. However, for some families, tuition is a financial challenge. The Scholarship Fund was established to provide financial assistance to campers who could not otherwise attend. In 2018 approximately 25% of the campers at Brookwoods, Deer Run, and Moose River Outpost received some level of scholarship assistance.

The Scholarship Fund is financed through current year donations to the **Annual Fund** and earned interest income from the **Inspiration Point Scholarship Endowment Fund**. The Endowment now stands at \$787K. Growing this fund through The Next 75 will provide a steady stream of scholarship assistance for future generations, and allow more kids to learn about God's love for them through the fun and adventure of camp.
